Today's celebration, The Feast of Christ the King—the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe—is a Christian celebration held on the last Sunday of the liturgical year, where the Church honors Jesus Christ as the ultimate ruler over all creation. Jesus as king presents the paradoxical image of one who has every reason to boast and show his power, yet chooses the path of non-violence, humility, service and love. The feast day was introduced in 1925 by Pope Pius XI in response to growing nationalism and fascism in Europe leading up to WWII.

Communion of the People



Outreach

Outreach November 15 & 16: The Pantry served groceries to 205 households, up by 8. This represents 291 individuals, an decrease of 81. We served 30 bags of ready-to-eat food. The same as last week. Hot Meals served 88 meals inside, 14 more than last week, and sent out 65 sandwiches to-go, 2 fewer than last week.
